I wish you very fruitful deliberations over the next few days in offering our world a new framework for insight, review, guidance and reform.


Conference Venue





VICTIMS OF INTERNATIONAL CRIMES THROUGH WAR IN UKRAINE
HUMAN RIGHTS DISCOURSES (plenary session I)



Prof. Viacheslav Tuliakov. Chair of Criminal Law in Odesa, Ukraine, introduced by Prof. José Luis de la Cuesta and Prof. Adán Nieto

Biography: Professor Viacheslav Tuliakov, Dr. of Law, National University «Odesa Law Academy» vice rector (Ukraine), European Court of Human Rights, ad hoc judge for the cases against Ukraine. Corresponding member of National Academy of Legal Science of Ukraine. Lecturer/Visiting Professor/Scholar in foreign Law schools and international programs (HEUNI, NIJ, USAID, TEMPUS, ERASMUS). Lectures and classes on International Law, European criminal law, Crime prevention, Legal Methodology, Human Rights, Victims` protection, Public Law and Protection of Human Rights. Authoring more than 250 works on Ukrainian legal doctrine, criminal policy and criminal justice, philosophy of criminal law and criminal justice, victims' rights protection and victimology. His doctorate thesis «Crime victim theory fundamentals» was the first monograph issue on the grounds of victimology in Ukraine».

Abstract: Being the author of UA Presidential Decree on the rights of victims of crime of 28.12.2004 and the first LLD on victimology in Ukraine, and now a refugee, the speaker will discuss the problems of victims of aggression against Ukraine, considering direct victimisation and the rights to compensate and redress in international criminal law. Moreover, secondary victimisation through psychological impact and violations of art 2, 3, 8 of ECHR and tertiary victimization in Ukrainian and Russian society in contradiction with art 6-13 of ECHR will be addressed.

**BEYOND VULNERABILITY: RE-CONCEIVING VICTIMS AS CITIZENS
(plenary session II)**



Prof. Robyn Holder. Senior Research Fellow, Griffith Criminology Institute, Griffith University, Australia, introduced by Prof. Dawn Beichner

Biography: Dr Robyn Holder is a socio-legal researcher who examines the interface between systems of justice and those who have experienced victimisation and injustice, and the mediating role of rights, especially human rights. Robyn is co-convenor, with Dr Nieke Elbers at the NSCR (Netherlands Institute for the Study of Crime and Law Enforcement), of a Law and Society Association International Research Collaboration that brings together early and mid-career scholars researching victims, citizenship, and justice. Her current projects include an investigation of practitioners adaption of investigative interview protocols, and another which explores accountability mechanisms of criminal justice decision-makers. Robyn continues to build on her Griffith Postdoctoral Fellowship examining the role of advocacy for victims in international criminal tribunals and its transferability to domestic jurisdictions. Abstract: The abstract public status of the 'ideal victim' has been sketched as someone weak, who is carrying out a respectable project and who is not to be blamed (Christie, 1986). This image has evolved as a portrayal of vulnerability. Clearly, individuals and groups within societies are vulnerable in different ways to crime, violence and exploitation, and to different types and forms of violation, bias and discrimination. An emphasis on vulnerability as the categorising device defining which victims receive state assistance and societal support has strengthened. In this presentation, I trace the different conceptualisations of vulnerability, the ways in which it is used, and examine some important changes in criminal justice responses to 'vulnerable victims'. However, I observe that the power to define who or what is 'vulnerable' is characterised by a narrowing of resourcing and recognition. Indeed, over the past 10-20 years, policy and legislative reform on victims' rights in criminal justice have drifted from recognition of universal entitlements to specific offerings to 'vulnerable' groups. I develop Christie's location of policy debates in victims' 'public status' to argue an alternative understanding of victims as being in a political relation to state institutions. They are citizens first whose rights and responsibilities are mutually constitutive of the state's obligations and duties to its citizens.

RESTORATIVE JUSTICE FOR VICTIMS OF TERRORISM: MERGING DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVES (plenary session III)

Dialogue between Barbara Dührkop (Graduate in humanities of the University of Uppsala, Sweden, and former teacher) & Pili Zabala (Graduate in odontology of the University of the Basque Country and teacher), moderated by Prof. Gema Varona (President of the Basque Society of Victimology)



Bárbara Dührkop (born in Hanover, Germany) was until 2009 a Member of the European Parliament, where she was a Vice-Chair of the Socialist Group. Her husband Enrique Casas was assassinated by the Comandos Autónomos Anticapitalistas (CAA), a branch of ETA. Within a longitudinal research of the Basque Institute of Criminology (University of the Basque Country) and other platforms, she has participated in several restorative justice projects. She has also participated in school programs and European initiatives to engage students in issues related to human rights of victims of terrorism.



Pili Zabala (born in Tolosa, Basque Country), former member of the Basque Parliament with Elkarrekin Podemos. The disappearance of her brother Joxi Zabala in 1983 marked her life; Joxi, an alleged member of ETA, was kidnapped, tortured and murdered by the GAL (state terrorism group). Since then, she became an activist for peace and reconciliation in the Basque Country. Within a longitudinal research of the Basque Institute of Criminology (University of the Basque Country) and other organisations, she has participated in several restorative justice and educative projects.

Abstract:

Departing from the current situation in the Basque Country, host of the Symposium, our key speakers will be sharing their different visions as victims on their participation in restorative justice projects developed in the Basque Country in cases of terrorism and political violence. Both have already participated in documentary films and books on the matter. Holding both a great interest in restorative justice from a victimological standpoint, they will offer us different visions about elements of justice and healing within restorative justice. In concrete, they will approach to what point can restorative justice be transformative or therapeutic, what is the meaning of apology and forgiveness

in this kind of process; and what should be the role of digital memorialisation practices. By contrasting reflective views with real experiences, the complexities and different intersections of restorative justice can be further debated with the participants in the Symposium. It should be stressed that the Basque restorative projects have called the attention of different researchers and international organisations such as the European Forum for Restorative Justice, the Radicalisation Awareness Network (RAN) and the informal network Encounter on Restorative Encounters (ERC) that in 2019 gathered victims, ex-offenders and facilitators of restorative justice in cases of terrorism and political violence coming from Italy, Northern Ireland, Spain, Belgium, and Israel. Barbara Dührkop and Pili Zabala have participated in the activities of these organisations and networks.

**KEEPER OF THE WINDS; AN EXPLORATION OF THE SPACE BETWEEN
THE HARMED AND THE HARMER IN RESTORATIVE JUSTICE
ENCOUNTERS (plenary session IV)**



Clair Aldington, introduced by Prof. Stephan Parmentier

Dr. Clair Aldington is an artist, designer and researcher based in Scotland, UK. She is also a Restorative Justice practitioner. In the UK Clair has worked with Youth Offending Services, as a regional Creative Arts Development Worker in Youth Justice and as an Arts Development Officer. In 2008 she co-founded Space2face, which is now an independent creative restorative practices organisation (www.space2face.org) in the Shetland Islands, Scotland. As a freelance creative practitioner, Clair has made and sold her own work and delivered residencies in a prison, an immigration removal centre, women's refuges, care homes and schools, working with regional and national organisations within the UK. She has also managed public art projects and was an artist advisor with the British Council (2015-2017). More recently she has been involved with the international restorative project, the 'Encounter of the Encounters'. She has a MA in Contemporary Arts and Music and a PhD in Restorative Justice and Design. Her research interests are restorative justice, making and gifting in times of transition, crime and conflict, and islandness.

Summary:

In this presentation Dr. Aldington will reflect on the business of the restorative justice encounter as being about the space between the harmer and the harmed. A space that is marked by the trauma and pain of victimisation yet also a space that is full of opportunity and creativity. Drawing on her practice as an artist, designer and restorative

justice facilitator, she will examine these different facets of the space between through the visual metaphor of the labyrinth as a keeper of the winds (Kraft, 1986; Saward, 2016) and as a design for crime prevention. Through this she posits that visual imagery and movement are important tools for the articulation of trauma as trauma is ‘initially organised without semantic representations’ (Ataria, 2015: 1051) indicating that people’s ability to verbally articulate trauma is limited. Additionally, there is consensus that verbal language struggles to properly capture trauma (Broudehoux & Cheli, 2022; Garnsey, 2016; Simić & Volcic, 2014) and further that trauma can limit a harmed person’s ability to learn languages, create a forgetting of language or even cause a retreat into silence (Busch & McNamara, 2020). This is at variance with many current western practices of restorative justice that centre on participants possessing significant oral language competencies (Hayes, 2017; Snow & Hayes, 2013; Snow & Sanger, 2011) as the primary tools with which to express their victimisation, trauma and remorse. In contrast, the architecture of memorialisation has been articulated as a ‘non-verbal language’ (Broudehoux & Cheli, 2022: 160) and that artistic language can bring new perspectives (Varona Martínez (2017) for the irreparable.

Participants will have an opportunity during the presentation to explore a labyrinth themselves and through it to investigate the space between the harmer and the harmed and the beginning of a dialogue between different perspectives.

VICTIMS AND TRASITIONAL JUSTICE: NARRATIVE TRUTHS FROM AN INTERSECTIONAL PERSPECTIVE (plenary session V)



Prof. Camilo Umaña, introduced by Prof. Fernanda Rosenblatt

Camilo Umaña is Research Professor of the Constitutional Law Department of the Externado University (Colombia)

Biography: Professor at the Externado University in Colombia where coordinates the Human Rights Master. He holds a PhD degree in Criminology from the University of Ottawa, Canada and a PhD degree in Sociology of Law from the University of the Basque Country. He has worked with several human rights organizations and transitional justice institutions including the Colombian Truth Commission, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights on transitional justice team, UNDP and the National Ombudsman on restorative justice.

Abstract: In a context like the Colombian one, transitional justice has adopted a restorative credential that is administered in a criminal judicial setting, which is presented as prospective, dialogical and restorative. On the other hand, the extrajudicial body of the truth commission, lacking an explicitly restorative identity, has operated with the desire to provide an interpretation of the armed conflict that builds bridges for

peaceful coexistence, that explains what happened to the victims and that gives meaning to the damage that allows building a post-conflict country. The two institutions, called the special jurisdiction for peace and the commission for the clarification of the truth, derived from the recent agreement between the FARC guerrillas and the Colombian government that seeks to respond to the rights of the victims. However, along with its implementation, Colombia is experiencing a situation of transmutation of the armed conflict where the long list of victimizations now also includes former combatants who signed the peace and in which there are at least five internal armed conflicts, more than 300 organized crime gangs exercising forms of control over the territories and an extreme reality in terms of human rights. This context presents a severe test for restorative ideas, especially in the face of its real potential to fulfil the promises it makes, to live up to the expectations it creates, to adapt in a context of minimum standards and to respond adequately to the rights of the victims as well as to guarantee a peaceful coexistence.

These concerns are woven from practical experience having participated in the truth commission as an investigator for the final report, in the office of the United Nations High Commissioner for the formation and initial implementation of the mechanisms of the comprehensive system, as an assistant to one of the delegations of victims who attended the peace negotiations in Havana and, ultimately, as a victim of the Colombian internal armed conflict that left him at 12 years of age without a father, a great human rights defender, lawyer and humanist who dedicated his life to protect the victims.



Professor of Clinical Psychology. University of the Basque Country (UPV/EHU), Spain. Research Director of Clinical and Health Psychology Program at the University of the Basque Country University (UPV/EHU), Spain

Abstract:

Despite the calls for interdisciplinarity in victimological science and practice, the criminal justice system continues to be fragmented in many ways. Even if the Directive 2012/29/EU of the European Parliament and of the Council of 25 October 2012 establishing minimum standards on the rights, support and protection of victims of crime, in line with the UN international standards on victims' rights, demands integral protection for victims and inter-professional coordination, the reality in many jurisdictions is that many victims keep being seen as instrumental in the criminal process causing them further secondary victimization, as the 2019 EU Fundamental Rights Agency study on victims of violent crimes has recently underlined. At the same time, there is a risk of converting the victims in pathological objects for psychological intervention by concentrating on individual victims without considering broader social and justice aspects. Concrete proposals to achieve a better collaboration among jurists and psychologists, as well as other professionals, will be discussed in order to approach a more holistic understanding of the processes of victimization and recovery, including the consideration of digital advancements.

1. VISIT TO THE PUBLIC SERVICE FOR RESTORATIVE JUSTICE AT DONOSTIA/SAN SEBASTIÁN COURT BUILDING/VISITA AL SERVICIO PÚBLICO DE JUSTICIA RESTAURATIVA

The Restorative Justice Service - dependent on the Department of Equality, Justice and Social Policies of the Basque Government - makes available to judicial bodies and citizens a free and complementary method to the judicial route for the resolution of conflicts that reach the courts. It provides its work in the criminal jurisdiction and in the civil-family jurisdiction in judicialized cases of separations and divorces with dependent minor children and in all the judicial districts of our Autonomous Community, remaining free of charge. The RJS offers an alternative to the judicial solution of conflicts and facilitates dialogue between aggressors and victims, with the help of a technical facilitator to try to reach an agreement within the framework of a criminal proceeding. In circles and conferences, the community can also be part of the restorative process, helping to find ways of agreement and reparation. In the field of civil-family jurisdiction, the process will help people to reach an agreement through dialogue (<https://www.justicia.eus/servicio-justicia-restaurativa>).

El Servicio de Justicia Restaurativa -dependiente del Departamento de Igualdad, Justicia y Políticas Sociales del Gobierno vasco- pone a disposición de los órganos judiciales y de la ciudadanía un método complementario a la vía judicial para la resolución de los conflictos que llegan a los Juzgados y Tribunales. Presta su labor en la jurisdicción penal y en la jurisdicción civil-familiar en casos judicializados de separaciones y divorcios con hijos menores a cargo y en todos los partidos judiciales de nuestra Comunidad Autónoma, permaneciendo su carácter gratuito. En el ámbito penal, la persona responsable de un delito y la persona que ha sido víctima de él pueden someterse de forma voluntaria al intento de solucionar su conflicto, acudiendo al Servicio de Justicia Restaurativa. People who have been victims of a crime can go to the Victim Assistance Service, a voluntary and free service dependent on the Department of Equality, Justice and Social Policies of the Basque Government. This purpose of this service is to accompany victims in their relationship with the penal system, verifying that the so-called "status of the victim in criminal proceedings" is respected (<https://www.justicia.eus/atencion-victima>).

criminalistics and international police cooperation (Urumea Pasealekua, 17, 20014 Donostia, Gipuzkoa).

Participants will visit the municipal police building (P.^o Galicia, 60) and enter into a conversation on the role of the Civil Guard responding to different forms of victimisations and different victim profiles in relation to the general and specific legislation on victims' rights. The museum on terrorism will also be visited and a debate will be opened on counterterrorism and human rights obligations.

7. JANE JACOBS WALK/RECORRIDO JANE JACOBS

This tour in the city of Donostia/San Sebastián will offer us to debate on place making and victimisation from a gender and minority perspective (<http://www.janejacobswalk.org/2021-walks/womens-names-in-district-east-of-donostia-spain>). Fear of crime or hot spots maps (https://www.donostia.eus/info/ciudadano/igualdad_plan.nsf/voWebContenidosId/NT00009AE?OpenDocument&idioma=cas&id=A374066376363&cat=&doc=D) will be contrasted with Jane Jacob's ideas on "eyes on the streets" for a more inclusive and participatory informal social control that allows questioning the Lefebvre's concept on the right to the city and the current prevention strategies, including the so-called "walking safe apps". The risk of place and group stigmatisation will be discussed.

Este recorrido por la ciudad de Donostia/San Sebastián nos ofrecerá debatir la creación de lugares públicos seguros desde una perspectiva de género y minorías (<http://www.janejacobswalk.org/2021-walks/womens-names-in-district-east-of-donostia-España>). Se contrastarán los mapas del miedo al delito o de puntos críticos (https://www.donostia.eus/info/ciudadano/igualdad_plan.nsf/voWebContenidosId/NT00009AE?OpenDocument&idioma=cas&id=A374066376363&cat=&doc=D) con las ideas de Jane Jacob sobre los "ojos en las calles" para un control social informal más inclusivo y participativo que permita cuestionar el concepto de Lefebvre sobre el derecho a la ciudad y las actuales estrategias de prevención, incluyendo las llamadas "aplicaciones para caminar segura", con el riesgo de estigmatización de ciertos lugares y colectivos.

8. VICTIM MEMORIALS WALK

Participants are invited to a walk in the city starting with the memorial of victims of the Civil War (https://www.donostia.eus/info/ciudadano/ddhh_paz.nsf/vowebContenidosId/NT00000A06?OpenDocument&idioma=cas&id=A513328493513&cat=Iniciativas&subcat=Placas%20memoriales%20en%20recuerdo%20a%20las%20v%C3%ADctimas%20del%20terrorismo%20y%20la%20violencia&doc=D). Later we will visit the joint memorial for victims of terrorism and then some individual memorials on victims of terrorism and political violence, following somehow the model of the “*Stolpersteine*” or “stumbling stones”. The pros and the cons of the different forms of memorialisations, as expressed by some victims, will be discussed.

Se discutirán los pros y los contras de las diferentes formas de memorialización, según lo expresado por algunas víctimas.

9. HONDALEA (DEPTH OF THE SEA) SCULPTURE AND GREEN VICTIMOLOGY/VISITA A HONDALEA PARA HABLAR SOBRE VICTIMOLOGÍA VERDE

Excavated inside the hollowed-out lighthouse, Iglesias's work incorporates the peculiar geology and ecology of the Basque coast and the wild waters of the ocean that surround the island. The work of Cristina Iglesias contributes a renewed conception of the sculpture practice. Her search for poetic and symbolic compromise between works and space is always materialised in an aesthetic, visual and dynamic display. Cristina Iglesias, from her own sculptural language, intervenes, and transforms a remote place converting it into a symbol for the defence of ecological causes and environmental conservation (<https://www.donostia.eus/ataria/en/web/hondalea/la-obra>). This visit will allow a reflection on green victimology.

Excavada en el interior de la casa del faro vaciada, la obra de Iglesias incorpora la peculiar geología y ecología de la costa vasca y la bravura de las aguas del océano que rodean la isla. La obra de Cristina Iglesias aporta una renovada concepción de la práctica de la escultura. Su búsqueda del compromiso poético y simbólico entre las obras y el espacio se materializa siempre en un despliegue estético, visual y dinámico. Cristina Iglesias, desde su propio lenguaje escultórico, interviene y transforma un lugar remoto dentro de la ciudad, convirtiéndolo en un símbolo de la defensa de causas ecológicas y de la conservación medio ambiental (<https://www.donostia.eus/ataria/es/web/hondalea/la-obra>). Esta visita permitirá una reflexión sobre la victimología verde.

10. VISIT TO THE PHOTO EXHIBITION VICTIMS OF SEXUAL ABUSE IN THE SPANISH CATHOLIC CHURCH: AN OPEN SECRET AT THE EXHIBITION CENTER OF THE UNIVERSITY CAMPUS

With funds from the newspaper *El País*, and commissioned by the journalist Juan Ignacio Cortés, author of the book in Spanish *Wolves with Shepherd's Skin* (2018), this exhibition collects the photographs of different victims of sexual abuse in the Spanish Church at a time when controversial steps have been taken on responses to this type of victimization. The participants will debate with Juan Ignacio Cortés on the idea of an open secret, on the unique stories of each photograph, and the particularities of the Spanish case, compared to other countries and institutional victimisations. This exhibition has been specifically created for the Symposium and is free and open during the whole week.

Con fondos del periódico *El País*, y comisionada por el periodista Juan Ignacio Cortés, autor del libro *Lobos con piel de pastor* (2018), esta exposición recoge las fotografías de diferentes víctimas de abusos sexuales en la Iglesia española en un momento en que se han dado pasos, controvertidos, sobre las respuestas a este tipo de victimización. Las personas participantes debatirán con Juan Ignacio Cortés sobre la idea de un secreto a voces, en las historias únicas de cada fotografía, y las particularidades del caso español, en comparación con otros países y victimizaciones institucionales. Esta exposición se ha elaborado específicamente para el Simposio y es gratuita y accesible a toda la ciudadanía y participantes durante toda la semana.

11. VISIT TO THE PHOTO EXHIBITION *LIFE/VIDA* BY GERVASIO SÁNCHEZ AT THE SAN TELMO MUSEUM/VISITA A LA EXPOSICIÓN *VIDA DE GERVASIO SÁNCHEZ*

In the words of its curator, Gerardo Mosquera: “This exhibition brings together a selection of 45 photos – many unpublished – taken by the awarded photojournalist Gervasio Sánchez in very different times, places and contexts. Contrary to his previous exhibitions and books, they have not been divided by theme, origin or date, as corresponds to his work as a reporter, dedicated especially to armed conflicts around the planet. If Sánchez is a great reporter of world stature, this exhibition presents him in a different way: he highlights an artist of the image. Gervasio is as much a poet as he is a reporter, without contradictions. He has not sought hedonism but a beauty with an edge, capable of enhancing and deepening the meaning of images that show us the tragedy of war and violence. He does not create an aesthetic of these misfortunes: he criticizes them through the aesthetic impact and the particular cognitive and communicative powers of art. As Antonio Muñoz Molina has said: “In his camera shot there is always a complaint and there is always poetry”. From Goya to Robert Capa, to today's media reporters, war chroniclers are usually death reporters. Sánchez is a reporter of life, of the triumph of life over destructive violence. This vision focuses all of his work, and it is the main theme of this exhibition. A poet, John Yau, has said that there are no longer any heroes: only survivors. But the survivors can also be winners, and Gervasio portrays them in their return to life. His images focus on teaching how life overlaps, how it manifests itself amidst the ruins of war and death, overcoming them. They often express a paradoxical, lacerating joy, because they document life that refuses to be annihilated. Beyond the mines, the disappeared, the bombings and Sierra Leone, this is the biggest story, the great event of permanent and ahistorical relevance that Gervasio Sánchez reports to us”.

This exhibition has been specifically brought for the Symposium, thanks to the San Telmo Museum, and is free and open during the whole week.

En palabras de su comisario, Gerardo Mosquera, sobre el fotoperiodista galardonado con el Premio Nacional: “Esta muestra reúne una selección de 45 fotos –muchas inéditas— tomadas por Gervasio Sánchez en muy diversos tiempos, lugares y contextos.

Al revés de sus exposiciones y libros anteriores, no han sido divididas por tema, origen o fecha, como corresponde a su labor como reportero, dedicado en especial a conflictos armados en todo el planeta. Si Sánchez es un gran reportero de estatura mundial, esta muestra lo presenta de modo distinto: destaca a un artista de la imagen. Gervasio es tan poeta como reportero, sin contradicciones. No ha buscado el hedonismo sino una belleza con filo, capaz de potenciar y volver más profundo el sentido de imágenes que nos muestran la tragedia de la guerra y la violencia. No crea una estética de estas desgracias: las critica a través del impacto estético y de los poderes cognoscitivos y comunicativos particulares del arte. Como ha dicho Antonio Muñoz Molina: “En el disparo de su cámara siempre hay denuncia y siempre hay poesía”. De Goya a Robert Capa a los reporteros mediáticos de hoy, los cronistas de guerra suelen ser reporteros de muerte. Sánchez es un reportero de vida, del triunfo de la vida sobre la violencia destructora. Esta visión enfoca todo su trabajo, y es el gran eje temático de esta muestra. Un poeta, John Yau, ha dicho que ya no hay héroes: sólo sobrevivientes. Pero los sobrevivientes pueden ser también vencedores, y Gervasio los retrata en su reincorporación a la vida. Sus imágenes se concentran en enseñar cómo la vida se sobrepone, cómo se manifiesta en medio de las ruinas de la guerra y la muerte, superándolas. Expresan a menudo una alegría paradójica, lacerante, porque documentan la vida que se niega a ser aniquilada. Más allá de las minas, los desaparecidos, los bombardeos y Sierra Leona, esta es la historia mayor, el gran suceso de permanente y ahistoria actualidad que nos reporta Gervasio Sánchez”.

Esta exposición se ha elaborado específicamente para el Simposio, con el apoyo del Museo San Telmo, y es gratuita y accesible a toda la ciudadanía y participantes durante toda la semana.

SOCIO-CULTURAL PROGRAM



Every day in the evening (from 6:45 to 8:15 pm), this is an invitation to a free artistic event, open to anyone interested beyond Symposium participants, followed by a debate with the artists/directors/participant (victims) and the public at the Centro Carlos Santamaría Antonio Beristain Auditorium¹ (in English and Spanish) of the University campus:

6th of June: Restorative music on gender violence. The composer and conductor **Francisco José Ríos-López**, the criminologist **Rocío Redondo Almándo** and the interpreter **Aitor Úcar González**, forming an interdisciplinary team, propose us a musical meeting in which all those victims of gender violence (and their supporters or professionals working with them) who wish to attend can participate, accompanied by a general audience. It will be interpreted the work for guitar PARADIGMA II: "and oblivion recorded your absences" created with the aim of making visible and musically representing the phenomenon of gender violence in society. Later, a dialogue will be organized in which all those who wish to participate will be able to share their personal experience.



7th of June: Emancipation and restoration for victims of gender violence through flamenco dancing with the participation of Elisabeth Garmendia and Soledad Ruz (*Centro Flamenco El Duende*). After the dancing, the debate with the public will include artistic imagination and thinking about the concepts on vulnerability and empowerment in relation to the overrepresentation of ethnic minority and migrant women and the Spanish prohibition of mediation (restorative justice) in intimate partner violence cases when the victim is a woman and the perpetrator a male adult. **Jorge**

Porras, psychotherapist from the Gakoa program for aggressors, will also join the debate.



8th of June: Adiorik gabe/Sin adiós/Without Goodbye on victims of terrorism and political violence. It is an artistic project on memorialism through music and poetry in the city, after Madrid, with more victims of this kind of violence in Spain. This artistic project was supported by the Donostia/San Sebastián municipality in 2016 and 2019 and externally evaluated by the Basque Institute of Criminology. A piece of the documentary film on the artistic piece developed in 2016 in memory of Francisco Javier Gómez Elosegui, killed by the terrorist group ETA, will be screened. There will be a debate with **Inesa Ariztimuño**, chair of the activity, and **Josemi Gómez Elosegui**, brother of Francisco, on the general project, where a very diverse group of victims participated.



9th of June: An awarded documentary film on non-accompanied foreign minors “Vidas menores”, with subtitles in English. The film portrays a group of Moroccan unaccompanied minors and their family environment, on their journey from their place of origin in Morocco to their way through cities in Spain, France, Germany or Sweden. Debate with **its director Alfredo Torrescalles and Ane Viana**, PhD researcher who has interviewed minors in the Basque Country, on victimimmigration and the criminalisation of the minor other.



PROGRAMA SOCIOCULTURAL

Todos los días por la tarde (de 19 a 20:30 hs.) se invita a un espectáculo artístico gratuito, abierto a todos los interesados, más allá de los participantes del Simposio, seguido de un debate con los artistas/directores/participantes (víctimas) y el público, en el Centro Carlos Santamaría del campus universitario, Auditorio Antonio Beristain (en inglés y castellano):

6 de junio: Música restaurativa sobre la violencia de género. El compositor y director de orquesta **Francisco José Ríos-López**, la criminóloga **Rocío Redondo Almandoz** y el intérprete **Aitor Úcar González**, formando un equipo interdisciplinar, nos proponen un encuentro musical en el que todas aquellas víctimas de violencia de género (y profesionales que trabajan con ellas) puedan participar. En él se interpretará la obra para guitarra PARADIGMA II: “y el olvido registró tus ausencias”, creada con el objetivo de visibilizar y representar musicalmente el fenómeno de la violencia de género en la sociedad. Posteriormente, se organizará un diálogo en el que todos/as aquellos/as que deseen participar podrán compartir su experiencia personal.

7 de junio: Emancipación y restauración de víctimas de violencia de género a través del baile flamenco con la participación de Elisabeth Garmendia y Soledad Ruz (Centro Flamenco El Duende). Tras una pequeña exhibición, el debate con el público incluirá la imaginación artística y la reflexión sobre los conceptos de vulnerabilidad y empoderamiento en relación con la sobrerrepresentación de las mujeres de minorías étnicas y migrantes y la prohibición española de la mediación (justicia restaurativa) en los casos de violencia de pareja cuando la víctima es una mujer y el perpetrador un adulto hombre. **Jorge Porras**, psicoterapeuta del programa *Gakoa* para agresores, también participará en el debate.

8 de junio: Adiorik gabe/Sin adiós sobre las víctimas del terrorismo y la violencia política en la ciudad de San Sebastián, después de Madrid, la ciudad con más víctimas de este tipo de violencia. Se trata de un proyecto artístico de memorialización a través de la música y la poesía, desarrollado con apoyo del Ayuntamiento de Donostia/San Sebastián en 2016 y 2019. Se proyectará un fragmento de la película documental sobre la pieza artística desarrollada, en 2016, en memoria de Francisco Javier Gómez Elosegui, asesinado por la banda terrorista ETA. Debate con **Inesa Ariztimuño**, directora de la actividad, y **Josemi Gómez Elosegui**, hermano de Francisco, sobre el proyecto general en el que participó un grupo muy diverso de víctimas.

9 de junio: Documental premiado sobre menores extranjeros no acompañados “Vidas menores”, con subtítulos en inglés. La película retrata a un grupo de menores marroquíes no acompañados y su entorno familiar, en su viaje desde su lugar de origen en Marruecos hasta su paso por ciudades de España, Francia, Alemania o Suecia. Debate con su director **Alfredo Torrecillas** y **Ane Viana**, investigadora doctora que ha entrevistado a menores en el País Vasco, sobre el fenómeno de la “victimigración” y la criminalización de los menores.
